I saw this question answered a little differently in the name of the Belzer rebbe.

The reason that in posuk heart is mentioned first is because an eye only sees what the heart wants. If you don't have a desire in your heart your eyes won't see. For example, my little son doesn't notice a beer poster in the local grocery, because he doesn't care about a swimsuit model advertising alcohol. But I do, on both counts.

So we need to conquer the heart, I.e. the underlying issues, lust etc, and then shniras aynayim is going to be that much easier.

For example, there were many times when I noticed an outrageously shmutzy thing while driving somewhere and commented to my wife, "Hey did you see *that*?" Invariably she'd answer, "Nope...what did I miss?" When I described it to her, she'd ask me how come I notice these things yet she never sees them! I got a funny kind of radar. (I have since stopped telling my wife about this stuff, after noticing that that discussing them kept them in my mind for longer, so now I only tell my wife about them if they remain tempting to me and I do not surrender them.)

At first, I thought she was perhaps just unobservant, dumb, whatever. Then it dawned on me that we notice - and see - the things that we desire and so, are on our minds (like 'milsa')

And on the other side of the coin, when I am sober and surrendered, seeing hookers, joggers, or dirty book stores and peep shows is not usually a 'trigger' for me. But If I *look at them intentionally* for any reason - they *become* triggers, and I sense the lust poison very clearly. It's terrible, so I do not typically look, b"H. Not because I am *good*, but because I am so *sick* that o'adayta o'inish ramva alei I cannot look at some of Hashem's people without having a lust problem. It's an allergy of mine.

When lust gets real estate in my head, life sucks. People - mostly my loved ones - become 'pains in the neck', my obligations - usually the most serious ones - become obstacles to 'my happiness', and the old insanity slowly, insidiously returns. (See the Chaza"l at the very end of this post! *That*'s what they mean.)

So for me, an addict, if my heart is *not* right, it pre-programs my eyes for schmutz-alertness. Then when I see it, it has an effect.

Even if my heart *is* right, looking intentionally (due to some stupid cheshbon), messes up my heart and has an effect.

The only way out for me is to keep my eyes clear of potential schmutz, to admit that the schmutz is not the problem at all - it's not *tum'ah*, just *people* - and to give my personal allergy some healthy respect, and to close my eyes when i see it and feel I want to 'take a better look'. Cuz if I enjoy what is *not* mine, I lose peace of mind with what *is* mine. (kol haneheneh mimah sh'ein lo, af mah she*yesh* lo, notlin heimenu! (Chaza"I somewere)
