I came home Friday afternoon to find my house a mess, my wife emotional, washing still wet and ironing nt done. at first I was annoyed, how can we have a shabbos in this mess?! then it struck me, I had to make a choice, I can either have a clean house (by shouting at my wife and running around like a crazy person cleaning up), or I can keep my sobriety. which do I choose? so I accepted the house as it was, did a few things calmly and went to shul on time. I felt very serene. and then the weird thing happened. when I went back home after shul, the house didn't seem messy at all!
