to answer the million dollar question:

Does Hashem ever mind us having to connect to him?

i don't have the ability to answer the question fully, but i will bring a few examples of people who Hashem doesn't really like.

one is honest in his calling to Hashem and expresses his feelings in his heart,

even if he is really wicked, Hashem will be close to him, as it says "karoiv Hashem l'chol koirov, l'chol asher yichruhu b'emes".

however if a person besides being wicked, wants to close to Hashem solely for personal gain, he may end up like Korach, in which Hashem accepted Moshe's tefilla, NOT to listen to his tefilla.

and like chazal say that sometimes Hashem will pay someone everything in this world, because he really doesn't want anything to do with this person in the next world, Hashem describes this person as "hated". we also find that Hashem says sometimes "rosho ma lecha l'saper chukoi"

what kilo said is also relevant also it is possible to do teshuva, until then that poor fellow is PERSONA NON GRATA (unwanted person).

people are very different, and Hashem made them that way, and therefore telling Hashem that one doesn't mind a connection, can work differently,

in one case Hashem may say "ok, take your time, i'm waiting for you", yet in a very different case Hashem may say "sorry, but although you don't mind, I DO,"

and this is because such an approach can be considered arrogant.

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To say that Hashem likes some people and not others implies that Hashem can change - sometimes He likes someone, sometimes He doesn't. Hashem does not change because He is already perfect.

We said it many times in many different ways over yom tov. In vechol maaminim for example Hashem is described as "Hashoveh" - unchanging.

The chazal that speak of Hashem hating a rosho says more about the rosho than Hashem so-to-speak. After all, if we feel far from Hashem, who moved?

I don't really understand the relevance of this question anyway. We only know Hashem from His actions, and we rely on His interactions with us. Time and again we praise Hashem for His patience and kindness to all, rosho included. again in vechol maaminim "Hatov, umaitiv loroim v'latovim"

In terms of this addiction Hashem is "Hagoel mimoves ufodeh mishachas". If we turn our wills and lives over to Him (a good summary of what r"h is all about) then He will redeem us from our self-imposed desolation.

In one Shemoneh Esrei on Rosh Hashanah, when I was attemptin' to talk to God, I understood somethin' that Dov has been sayin': One can find religion after sobriety.
