Shmiittah has relevance in every year & in every moment, because the crux of this mitzvah is to emphasize the point that Hashem runs & owns the world. This is not a repressive thought but a liberating one when we realize that it is Hashem that gives us constantly all the goodness that we have in this world-our humanness, our faculties, our food,-everything come from Hashem who is Good & bestows Good to all.

its brought down that when you buy a sefer & you want to claim ownership on it you should write your name but not to write "this sefer is mine-signed by ------", Perhaps this too is to indicate that true ownership is Hashem's-this sefer & everything else is a loan from Hashem. When you write your name, this indicates that you have a calling-a shlichus-from Hashem. He has given you this sefer as a kind gifted loan-to appreciate it & to serve Hashem with joy through it.

when you walk down the streets -realize that it is Hashem's streets you are walking on.-He is the King-the Owner of the world-this thought give us joy & awe in recognizing that you are privileged to be a subject of the King of Kings (who is also a Kind Father!!)

your body is a loan from Hashem too. He gifted to us many pleasures connected to your body such as eating, drinking, & using our five senses in a healthy way. & in married life,intimacy with one's wife & husband, the physical, emotional & spiritual pleasure connected with it comes from our King-& we tell Him (by conducting ourselves in this area according to His will) that we do not take this gift for granted. This adds a deeper joy to the experience.He is the one that placed this person in your life & in your arms-no one else.

Here we barely touched the surface of this vast subject that has so may practical applications.

We can grow exponentially, enjoying life more & also make our lives so much more meaningful when we recognize the Source of Good when we experience this goodness.

Not that life isn't devoid of pain & suffering & how to cope with that is a subject that is very important & should be studied & discussed on a practical level. But this concept, of recognizing that nothing is random & God is in total control with our ultimate good in mind-helps us alleviate the suffering & increase our joy in life which is a crucial aspect in living our lives in a healthy & productive way

"Im BechuKosai Tailaychu If "you "walk" in My "statutes"-the first words of this sedrah-teaches us a valuable lesson in life

A Chok refers to commandments that are beyond comprehension -when to the human mind it makes little or sense-when we fail to see any logical benefit from doing these commandments (example-why is meat ok, & milk ok, but meat+milk-not ok?)

Yet, we "walk" with these mitzvos, we don't walk with our minds but with our feet-we do these mitzvos with faith -emunah-not because its comprehended in the mind or emotionally felt in the heart. We simply have emunah that Hashem wants us to do these mitzvos & we do them. This is a crux & key to serve Hashem-with pure faith.

For example, we must appreciate the value of praying to Hashem 3 times a day (by men, & by women at least once a day). Of course it would be wonderful to be excited & motivated & enthusiastic about each & every prayer of each & every day. But when one goes to shul, prays every day, 3 times a day, even when he is not in the "mood", even when he is not inspired, even when he struggles to concentrate-that is a sign of a true Eved Hashem. your showing Hashem the commitment -eventually He will give you the gift of enjoying it-but eve when its not there-or especially when its not there-it is a very precious thing that Hashem values & loves you for

Same applies by a family Shabbos Seudah. Sometimes, its uninspiring, everyone's tired, some are irritable, even saying kiddush or singing zemiros feels like a drag. But ultimately, you say kiddush & sing zemiros anyhow & try your best. you are honoring Hashem with Shabbos. would it be nice to feel it? of course it would. but dont think these rituals are meaningless. In a sense, they have even more valued than in those times that you are inspired.

Same is true with marriage. At times it feels wonderful, when husband & wife are extremely close & attuned to each other. Then, there are times, may times, even in the very most best of marriages when the relationship feels stagnant, where the connection is not strongly felt, when either stress or boredom (2 opposite causes). When the sexual intimate aspect also feels unexciting or unfulfilling. Of course, with time & patience & prayer & mutually working together, a husband & wife can renew & strengthen their physical & emotional relationship. But one must realize the beauty & importance & act of love & kindness it is to behave in accordance to the committement & loyalty towards ones wife or husband even if you don't feel it. This is the mark of a true love. the emotions, the warm feeling, the physical desire, the fiery exciting -no one is saying its not important-because it is.. but in life, Hashem created many moments & situations & time spans when these are hidden, & He wants to see how you act when you dont feel these things which make it easy for you to be a loving husband or wife.& when you behave with love even when you dont feel in love.

All blessings come from "walking" in His "statutes"-He will ultimately give you all the gifts of renewal & excitement & love but He wants us to serve Him by walking, by the feet, by the action, by simply serving Him purely & sincerely.

each one of us have the ability to kindle the light of the soul of another Jew-to elevate him or her to the point where the other Jew can be illuminated on their own

There are also 7 ways to kindle the lights-to inspire & teach others. However the one primary method to do so is the path of Aharon-to kindle another through chessed & ahavah-through kindness & love

Paradoxically, when you focus on elevating & inspiring your brothers & sisters, you end up inspiring yourself. Why? because in truth, all our souls are connected.we are in essence one-so when we genuinely try to help others-we end up helping ourselves as well.

Chazal praise the consistency of Aharon-that his service never changed

- 1) it was always done with the same fervor & enthusiasm & with the same fiery love for his people-he always -each & every day-renewed himself & inspired others with his love & compassion
- 2)He never deviated from the structure of the mitzvah. There is a powerful lesson in this. Hashem appreciates our creativity & fiery love for our people but at the same time He desires for us to channel this creativity in a healthy structure-like a fire contained in a fireplace-to value the gifts of that fire but to also create borders so that the fire doesn't spread & destroy. This is one of the challenges in life-to value creativity & healthy expansive expression & at the very same time express it within the borders that Hashem designed us to have for our benefit.

1-Rashi explains the connection between the story of Miriam & the Spies in that the spies should have learned from what happened to Miriam & refrained from speak loshon hora. From here we see a very important concept in life. Everything we see & hear, everything we experience are lessons to be learned on how to behave-it's Hashem that gives us these experiences to learn from -this is Hashem "talking" to us on a constant basis. We can pray to Hashem to allow us to have the wisdom to see these signs & events & to interpret them properly so that we can know what Hashem wants from us.

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2-Challah is the idea of taking the "first"-the "beginning "-& giving that to Hashem. Modeh Ani in the morning in expression if this challah concept. Using our first thought & words to Hashem to express our gratitude to Him & acknowledging that He is the source of our life. Its the blessing we make before a mitzvah or before we eat food or drink water. -that too is the challah concept-praising Hashem & thanking Him right before we take an action or experience pleasure. & though there are no formal blessings recited before engaging in marital intimacy,, we can still thank Hashem & express out gratitude to Him for gifting us our spouse & for giving us this experience. Same applies with every kindness Hashem gives us. By giving first to Hashem our experience in this kindness becomes a very rich & powerful experience

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
