If we're doing it because we want to run away from decisions, that's not a good thing, and hopefully, our mentors guide us to be able to make our own decisions (although I've seen people take this WAY too far, when you have 20 year olds thinking that they've already gotten everything they need, so they never need to ask advice ever again).

Musar is always necessary - by which I mean, serious introspection, thinking, "am I doing what's right? What can I do to improve?" And then doing it...

Some people say that all religion is a crutch - I'm sure many of us have heard the phrase (said condescendingly), "oh, it must be so comforting to think that the world is being run by a benevolent god."

My response? Just because it's comforting doesn't mean it isn't true.

Torah, judaism - it *does* free us. We just have to be careful to not follow blindly, but to make our connections real - our connections with god, with our friends, parents, rabbeim, with ourselves.

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
