Rabbi Miller explained to someone that even though there was no geniune intent to marry & therefore there was no real significance to their actions, he wanted them to give the <i>get</i> (along with all that it entails! [i.e. The girls get the status of a [i]Gerusha[/i]!] to teach them a lesson about the severity of their actions
