I probably need to really work on step three as well; I know that I need to surrender to Hashem 100%, but actually doing it ain't so easy...

Isn't this a stirah?

Well, OF COURSE IT IS, but **ONLY** when HE'S looking out to make sure that SHE'S keeping HER chazal, and SHE'S looking out to make sure HE'S keeping HIS.

I'll leave it to your imagination what some sample dialogues of that scenario would be...

But, when he's focused on HIS job alone, looking for how he can put her on a pedestal, show his gratitude for all she does for him, and he cares more about her honor than his own - by not leaving his socks on the floor or going out in a stained shirt (after all, his appearance and the household are an extension of herself in her mind... see "The River, Kettle & the Bird"), and she in turn is focused on HER job alone, looking for ways to fulfill his will, even his UNSPOKEN
