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It's possible that Hashem's love is unconditional on the lowest level, but the level on which He relates to us is directly related to how we relate to Him. This is learned out of the four levels that Adam and Chava related to each other. The lowest level is *zanav*, then *achor b'achor*, then *panim* el panim, and finally *yechidus* (bassar echad).

When we relate to Hashem in a back to back manner, i.e., we don't want to see Him rather we just want him to provide us with our need and not punish us (avodah m'yirah), he reciprocates by providing for us but without wanting to look at us. When we relate to Hashem like a tail, i.e. that we don't think about Hashem at all and just follow because we are stuck to our traditions and routines, Hashem reciprocates by not occupying His "mind" with us either.

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It follows that someone who doesn't believe in Hashem at all is on an even lower level of a relationship with Hashem. It's true that Hashem waits for His children to return to him, and it's possible that He loves us unconditionally, but it's a huge mistake to think that the love always remains the same.

If a person feels that "Hashem doesn't like the **action** that I did", that would be a wonderful reaction. But when a person feels "Hashem doesn't want *"me"* anymore, now that I've sinned" - this kind of thinking will make a person become disconnected from his relationship with Hashem.

After a person sins, chas v'shalom, he must feel two things at once. First of all, he must realize that he has gone against Hashem's will, and that Hashem did not desire at all this evil action that he has done. But at the same time, he must also feel, no less and perhaps even more so, that although Hashem didn't want this action he has committed, Hashem still wants him as a person.

As part of my step 2 inventory I'm going through the chumash and writing down my questions on the pesukim.

It's starting to emerge that there is too much evidence that God does have some of the traits that I don't like. In other words, my theory that I have entirely the wrong idea about God is not correct.

Instead, it appears so far that God values me a lot more than I ever thought possible, that He's extremely invested in how I turn out, and that the story of God and man is about a relationship, really a love story. Tensions can run high, and God adjusts His behavior as man adjusts his.

I think in my step 2 I need to make a conscious decision to approach God to bring out His most pleasant, merciful and loving side. And I do see myself coming to believe that if I do that, then God will respond in kind.

And I do believe these findings reflect exactly the Jewish position on God. He has many attributes, it's a relationship, and we need to bring out the best in Him.

And there will be times when this operation doesn't pan out and at those times people need to stick together until the storm passes. And for addicts "together" requires other addicts. Normal people, who don't drag along inside the wreckage of their past can feel "together" with normal people.

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I think when it says "came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity" just simply means let go of the tree of knowledge of good and evil. That is the source of a lot of correct knowledge and opinions, but also of a lot of nonsense, often mixed together. Se it down and reach for the genuine article, which is outside ourselves somewhere. It can be found in God, seforim, other addicts, doctors, family, your sponsor, and who knows where else. As long as it's not inside.
