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Quit fooling yourself. You are not sober *in SA* - you are sober *in Hashem*. Only with Hashem. If you use SA right, it brings you to *into* Hashem. For years, we lived as though we were 'outside Hashem', as most people do - and can get away with. Addicts cannot. If we are not in Hashem, we die.

Near the end of AA, they wrote (I paraphrase), "Each member in his personal story (printed at the end of AA) describes how he established his or her own relationship with G-d." That is how AA sees recovery - it is not about not drinking, for anyone can 'not drink' for a time. But they are saying that true Recovery boils down to one shayloh: Are you in a genuine relationship with your G-d - or are you just getting more *religious*? 'Religion', practically speaking, is about keeping rules. A relationship with G-d (or with another *person*) is definitely *supported* by rules - but it is not *created and defined* by the rules themselves.

For how many years did **we** say to ourselves, "well, at least I get to shul on time; learn well; really care about being mekarev other yidden; really feel deveikus during davening; know the shulchan aruch better than most people, etc. - as a nechomah for our acting out? And what's so bad about that?

Well, at some point it is no longer a nechomah. Hypocrisy eats us alive, until even the great sweetness of our drug-of-choice doesn't work so well any more, and we up the ante. Soon it starts to weigh too much...

Boruch Hashem you are finding this before too long, that you are getting recovery now. Wow!

Today I am sober according to SA's definition for 143 days with 26 days on the GYE chart. This is mostly because of the fellowship of SA and all the tools of GYE, especially TaPhSiC. I am

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working a little on Step 3.

For many years I have being defining my level of closeness to Hashem by how frequently I have been masturbating. Now I see that there is much more to it than that. I am lusting less and being shomer my eyes more but I think I was much closer to Hashem a few years ago even when I was acting out.

I meant that is how people generally *use* it. Not what it really *is*. Even frum decent people may use it that way. Not to really get a relationship with Hashem, but to please Him so that their lot will be better. Is that evil? I think not. Is it a low madreigoh? In this day and age, I think not.

But that is just not the way that *addicts* can successfully use religion, it seems to me. The precious thing for us about religion is that it connects us close with G-d while we are here on this goofy planet and with our goofy brains. And it is not because we are on a higher madreigo than non-addict yidden, but because we are more delicate and in greater danger than others.

Kind of like I think the Chovos haLevavos puts it. And the Zohar, too. They both say that the mitzvos are the *eitzos* to get a relationship with Hashem.

It is not a question of keeping *halocha*, but a question of focus. One can certainly be a *very* good Jew heeding the Chofetz Chayim's typical mussar about doing mitzvos for great schar in Olam haBa rather than being a fool and running after Olam haZeh. But for addicts, that focus completely misses the point. Addicts like me need the mishna of Antigonus ish Socho, who said "Al ti'hiu ka'avodim ham'shamshin es haRav al m'nas l'kabel p'ras - ella hevu ka'avodim ham'shamshin es haRav *shelo* al m'nas l'kabel p'ras, vihi morah Shomayim aleichem."
