I have no idea about the statistics. Do you have a source?

If its the fact that our rules are stricter aren't our rules stricter because the torah teaches us whats more moral. Thus breaking those strict moral rules makes our life more unmanagble (whereas your secular individual deosnt feel low about masterbating thus life is not unmanagbel to him). So in essence our strong moral values bring us into SA?

My meaning was only that we have more restrictions. There's a cliche called Catholic guilt the same as Jewish guilt. The guilt can be a factor in making life unmanageable, but it's not productive, and I suspect may not be what Hashem wants from us even if it was productive.

Lastley why can't we incorporarte it into our recovery?

That's a humdinger. There's got to be a hundred people here who can answer that better than I, but here's my 2 cents.

I have a feeling that we are not only spiritually but also emotionally weaker than previous generations so guilt tends to become counter-productive.

A component of lust addiction is being self-centered which precludes a connection to the Torah that is strong enough to influence our behavior. So first we have to get rid of the parts of our character that interfere - selfishness, fear, resentment. Once those are out of the way, then we have a chance of implementing the values we were taught.

Additionally, those negative traits are what drives escapism, so it's a double whammy.
