With Hashem's help, I chose sanity and enjoyed the rest of the evening as a normal human being.

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Shalo"h Hakadosh wrote that the cohen needs to see the person he is being mechaper for in order to connect w/him while shechting and being mekabel the dom, maybe during zrikah, too...but if it is a 'her' then looking at her intently is not proper. So they made the Kior reflective (using the mirrors of the women whp merited yetzias mitzrayim) and placed it at the entrance to the Ezras Noshim where the lady bringing her chatas would stand. He would see her reflection and keep things *proper*. After all, ein mevi'in mei raglayim (mild hirhurim) bamikdosh (into the mind) mipnei hakavod!

It's funny that the mirrors the cohen used in order to maintain propriety while effecting kaporah were the very mirrors used by the women in Mitztrayim to get their exhausted and depressed husbands sexually interested in them at the end of a long, horrible day. Rashi says they would get their husbands to look at them both in the mirror and the women would say to them, "See? I am more attractive than you are! (ani na'ah mimcho)" One might ask, why didn't they just say to them, "See how attractive I am!". A teacher of mine suggested that it was their way of saying "you are attractive...but see how I am even more so than you are!" Showing another person how much they are appreciated (and in a marriage, even just physically) is important! It is part of real loving. It's not just lust, but a relationship. (PS, This was completely impossible for me to approach until I was sober for a few years and working the steps be"H.)

It's cool that these mirrors were used in order to effect the kaporah of the korbonos. The bechinah of cohen is ahavah/Chessed and that is how he does his avodah and how he serves his fellow Jew - and Jewess. (L'voreich es amo Yisroel *b'ahavah*!, the cohanim say)

I'd like to suggest that it contrasts the difference between lust and love. Roy wrote that love kills lust just as much as lust kills love. The mirrors of the women were used for sex and p'ru ur'vu. But they *worked* by appreciating, understanding, and connecting each other...in other words by *loving* each other, not by creating wild lust.

Da'as and Dibur were in golus (not functioning) in that generation. The Torah calls sex between spouses, "da'as". For a generation that had Da'as (the mekor of sexuality and Shoresh of Yesod) in *golus*, this was quite a feat! The women overcame the gap through patience and love.
