Perhaps that can help explain it. I think I heard something like this from a Rabbi Tatz recording once.

It is part of the difference between male and female (notice I did not say men and women). Male, is about ideas, limitless possibilities. Thus, the difficulty finishing a project, and perhaps why we often live in fantasy, and why many of us procrastinate, and have a hard time with committment.

Female, is about bringing things to fruition (think babies). It is a female traid to get things done.

Not sure if this is pertinent to the discussion, but it may be. Ideas are by nature of a more spiritual and infinite nature. Anything expressed into the pysical world is more limited and finite.
