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Hello Tzaddikim!

And I mean Tzaddikim!

I was alerted to this awesome thread by Chizuk e-mail #498. If you think that us guys are not the ones that will bring the ultimate geula, then who will? Rebbi Akiva didn't. Neither did the Baal Shem Tov or his talmidim. It is us guys who bust it every day and are fighting an all out war - sometimes losing and sometimes winning, who will bring the geula.

After reading this e-mail thread, I came to a new understanding of the Gemorah in Sukah on Nun Bais Amud Aleph which states that Rebbi Yehuda says that when Moshiach comes, Hashem will bring the Yetzer Horah and shecht him in front of the eyes of Tzadikim and the Rashaim and both will start to cry. The Tzadikkim will look at the Yetzer Horah and see it as a mountain and cry "how was it possible to conquer such a high mountain". The Reshaim will look at the Yezter Hara like it was a single hair and cry "how could it be that we weren't able to conquer such a little Yezer Harah".

The Gemara is very puzzling and many explanations have been given. What I now understand as a result of this thread is that as we are going higher and higher, the Yetzer Hara is working much harder and causing that the triggers that were insignificant until now, to become very significant. As a result, in order for us to continue the fight, we have to now fight with "all we got" against these previously innocuous triggers. In other words, the higher the tzaddik climbs, the taller the mountain becomes. This is the true meaning of the Gemorah in Berachos Lamed daled amud bais that in the place that a Baal Tshuva stands, a totally righteous person can

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never reach. That is because guys who experienced the mud and have somewhat succeeded in climbing out of it, are experiencing a taller mountain then the ones who never experienced the mud in the first place.

We should be celebrating the fact that smaller triggers are affecting us since it is an indication that we are succeeding. That will give us Chizuk to continue the climb.
